Love is, after all, an emotion. We know the distinct difference between emotion and logic as it is common knowledge that emotional decisions are generally more risky than logical ones. Good deeds do not generate affection in the doer. But genuine affection will automatically produce good deeds toward others.

If you are a generous or kind person, ask yourself if you are this way in order to gain the approval, respect and admiration of those observing you. If not, it is likely that you have genuine affection for those upon whom your generosity rests.
