Intensity, Ecstasy, Intimacy

We will come to God by way of Intensity, Ecstasy or Intimacy.

Christians commonly approach God with Intensity and believe that this is what God desires from us. We can try to find our satisfaction in being strong, heroic, and successful while using whatever weapons necessary to win a war for God in order to affect the Kingdom of God and the hearts of others. Although God desires our affection, this would be the least satisfying type of expression. Think about our own relationships. Would it be satisfying in our relationships with children if we received only servitude-type performances from our children based on fear, duty or sheer respect?

Many Christians also approach God with Ecstasy wherein we arrive in church with regular frequency to be lifted up emotionally in the presence of God and experience euphoria with God in the moment. We can really feel the draw during the week to experience it again. These ecstasies may be in the form of songs that make us rejoice, laugh, cry or otherwise express strong emotions for and with God. But

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once the ecstasy is over, within a very short time, usually within hours or even minutes, the ecstasy has abated and we can be easily ruled by our circumstances again or our daily routine. Then we run from ecstasy to ecstasy living like an emotional yo-yo. Many times this leaves us largely lonely for God as we inadvertently lose sight of Him and His presence with us when the ecstasy subsides in a short while.

Few Christians it seems truly experience Intimacy with God, even though most would say they desire to have it. Intimacy is the state of being fully aware and connected to God's presence in us all day and all night. It might be described by words like belonging, inseparable, warm, loving, affectionate, familiar and comfortable. This is of course the most difficult place to find ourselves - resting in our relationship with God, since we have many things to be responsible for which end up being distractions from God. We have been raised to be self-centered (self-sufficient) and to take care of the things pertaining to our own well-being. This self-centeredness is even taught as a virtue by "owning" our part of the world or being responsible for our life.

But even though in the beginning of the journey to Intimacy with God it seems counter intuitive for us to not focus on the "details" of our lives and let God handle them, once we have practiced this way of living with God enough it will be in this place that we find the peace and rest in all circumstances that Jesus promised. It will then be as difficult for us not to think of God all the time as it was difficult in the beginning to accustom ourselves to thinking of God all the time.

The ultimate in ministry of the Kingdom of God is to reach that point in our experience with God where we can actually resonate with Jesus' words: "Come unto me, all you who labor and are heavy laden and I will give you rest, for My yoke is easy and My burden is light." Yet most of us have never learned to appropriate these truths in our daily experience of God.

When Intimacy with God is experienced, we will be able to express our intimate, passionate affection for God with Intensity or Ecstasy or both. The reason Intimacy is the ultimate experience of God is that when either the Intensity or Ecstasy subsides, we remain so fully aware of God's love and presence with us that we no longer have the same desire toward sinful behaviors and broken relationships in order to escape our insecurity. In other words, Intimacy with God provides a constant supply of Love, Acceptance, Worth, and Security from the one that created us with these needs in the first place. Since it is always the lack of one or more of these basic needs that sends us into sinful behaviors and broken relationships, finding ourselves to be fully loved and our needs fully met in Christ will provide the life source to live above sin's power.

From manuscript:

Do you have intensity for God or intimacy with God?

Beth Moore related this story to us when she spoke at Phillips Arena in Atlanta at the Living Proof Live seminar "Full Redemption" in September, 2003. It was about how she came to have a passion for God's Word. As I relistened to this message in January of 2011 in preparation for using "Full Redemption" in a "WOMEN walking FREE" retreat at RELIFE Ministries International in May of that year, the Lord gave me pause and revealed one of the most significant truths to me that I have ever received in nearly 5 decades as a Christian. Read the story and then take in the revelation which follows:

Beth Moore speaking:

I was asked to teach a Sunday School class when I was in my mid twenties. By this time I was already doing a little speaking. But to be honest with you, I was the worst Sunday School teacher you have ever heard in your life. I'll tell you the reason why. Because it is hard to teach a Bible that you never even open.

An announcement in the church bulletin described a Bible doctrine class that was starting. I thought, O.K., alright I felt the call. I knew I was going to have to surrender. God was telling me, "You are pitiful. Go. Go. Go." So I went and here's what happened.

This dude, this wide, with a chest this thick, former football player, solid muscle, walks up to the podium and throws open his Bible and he begins to teach. I've never seen anything like it in my life. "You don't want to take this Word lightly!" he said loudly. "This is the God breathed Word! I suggest you inhale!"

I never even opened my Bible. I never wrote a note. While he taught, that big old football player cried over his love for the Word. He was the first person I ever saw teach with his white starched shirt pounding, because his heart was filled with zeal.

As soon as that class was over, I ran like a maniac to my car. I locked myself in it. And I screamed out loud, "Lord, I don't know what that was! But I want it! I want it! I want it! I want it!" And God took a stick to a stone in heaven. And He lit a match. And He stuck it in my heart. And I've had it ever since. When I stand up to teach, my heart just pounds, because I can't bear the joy of it. Sometimes I can feel God's presence so heavy on our heads I feel like I can't stand up! I cant' stand up!

Later in the seminar Beth stated, "Some things are taught. And some things are caught."

God's revelation to the author of this treatise:

I knew that day that I needed to be "caught" with Buddy Walter's kind of zeal. But it was not until 8 months later that God revealed to me what it was that I really wanted to have as a believer. In May of 2004, in Baltimore, Maryland, as I hugged Beth in the receiving line after her taping of "The Patriarchs" Bible study, I felt like I was hugging Jesus and not Beth. I actually uttered those words. Not to her, but it just came out. I knew then and there that I wanted to be so full of Jesus some day that someone might hug me and think that they were being hugged by Jesus instead.

For the next two years, after God assigned to me a personal mentor such as Beth's Buddy Walters, I submitted patiently to all that my mentor had to teach me. I learned that I had developed an intellectual understanding of God and not an intimate relationship. Once released from mentoring in May of 2006, I knew that somewhere along that journey I had become passionate about Jesus and it showed in every area of my life, work, play, market, home, vacation.

God had promised to give me a passion for Him and had also asked me to take note of how my make-over had occurred so that I could share it with others. God wants every believer to be madly in love with Him. So as directed, I took note of the process or maybe more appropriately perspectives of God which changed. I know that the process is different for each person, but the Lord showed me that there are certain essential perspectives of God that every one must discover before they will become madly passionate lovers of God.

As the teachings for RELIFEic.org were put into transferrable form, these essential perspectives of God became the focal point of the conferences and retreats. These perspectives are simple, Biblical, and irrefutable. They have nothing to do with doctrine, tradition, or denomination. They have only to

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do with the desire God has for every believer to be so "in love" with God that they cannot be silent about their lover. And this applies to any person regardless of color, race, or creed.

We had conducted men's retreats, MEN walking FREE, for a few months when we were led to create WOMEN walking FREE. In order to modify the teaching to be better suited to women, we were led to include these Beth Moore teachings. And as I heard Beth say that it was Buddy's zeal that had changed her life, the Lord said to me very clearly, "That was the wrong word. Yes, Buddy did have "zeal." But Buddy had something much much more. Buddy had intimacy." As I pondered what God had just said I realized that there is a tremendous difference between "zeal" and "affection," between "intensity" and "intimacy."

The Lord further clarified to me that you can have intensity without intimacy, but you cannot have intimacy without intensity. The major difference is this: *Intensity Leads with Heroic Ferocity and Spears while Intimacy Leads with Humble Tenderness and Tears*. One reason the Jews do not recognize Jesus as their Messiah is that they were expecting an "intensely zealous" leader, but God provided and "intimately tender" Messiah. And the disciple should be like his master. As believer's in Jesus, we should be "intimate" not just "intense."

As I continued to explore the ramifications of this perspective I was overwhelmed at the simplicity and profundity it contained. Cooperation is fueled by tenderness while competition is fueled by ferocity. Most believers' intensity is mistaken for intimacy. Yet most believers would prefer to be an applauded hero than an anonymous care giver. Yet our Master, Jesus washed the feet of His disciples the night before His crucifixion. I then saw the disconnection between the church and her mission. We mistook the great commission as: "Go and convert people to Christianity, teaching them what to wear, what to say, what to do, and how to look like us." However, the great commission is this: "Go and make disciples who love like their Master." Then John 13:34 & 35 becomes true of the body of Christ. It is NOT our behaviors that lead people to Christ. It is our love, and only our love that will lead them in the way of our Master.

The icing on this cake is this. When you come to the point where you can love like Jesus (notice also Peter with Jesus in John 21), the Spirit of God can compel them by that love to become part of the Body of Christ. When your intimacy with God overcomes your need to intensely hammer God's truth into people, both saved and unsaved, you then and only then become a true disciple of Jesus. He loved unconditionally (both saved and unsaved). He showed mercy unconditionally (both save and unsaved). He forgave unconditionally (both saved and unsaved -- Pharisees and Thief on the cross). And He unconditionally shows favor (both saved and unsaved).

The significance of this revelation is this. People without a marital relationship to God can live morally good lives, give to charitable causes, and treat each other with kindness. But ONLY SPOUSES OF GOD can LOVE LIKE GOD! When we fail to do so, we cannot be fishers of men, because LOVE is the only bait that draws them into our fishing nets or CATCHES them.

Ecstasies: hot flashes with God. Affection for God includes three primary expressions of humans toward God. We have already talked about the difference between intensity and intimacy. Yet there is another, maybe the most common or popular approach to affection for God. This third ministry of affection for God is ecstasy. Visions, dreams, and other things that titillate the soul are certainly valid experiences of affection toward God. However these things are more God's manifestations to us to bring pleasure to us. Widely sought after, week after week in religious circles and communities around the globe, these times of ecstasy are experiences, often en mass, which make us feel close to God, but those feelings tend to dissipate in moments.

What happens with ecstasies is that as we are drawn into almost orgasmic experiences with God in these moments, religious concerts, praise times in church, being slain in the spirit, and so forth, as we are caught up in the experience of euphoria. But once these moments of ecstasy have abated, we're back to the place of dealing with the distractions and distortions of life in our own ways and means. Yet there is not a continued peace and calm in the midst of the tumult and turmoil of life. Rather we look and feel pitifully helpless, as do all others, especially those who have not come to Jesus for salvation.

When turmoil, anguish, anxiety, and the like happen upon us, we seek ecstasy with God as a means of escape from our fear and insecurity. When we seek that ecstasy at a time when God has not placed on our calendar an event through which we might attain to it, we tend to seek escape from our misery in what ever carnal pleasure gives us the greatest and fastest deliverance. Apart from an ecstatic experience with God, we find its counterfeit in our own sordid activities. As with all addictive behaviors, which are fueled by our need to escape, even "good deeds" may be used as a means to cloak the symptoms or feelings of our insecurity.

Although there is great value in each form of our expression of affection toward or for God, intensity, ecstasy, or intimacy, it is my belief that the current disdain for God's people around the globe is due to the fact that so few "so-called" Christians possess the highest form of affection for God, which is intimacy. It was the intimacy of Jesus with His disciples wherein He poured Himself completely, incessantly and selflessly into their lives, that they became so like Him that nothing could silence their praise and adoration for Him and an unconditional, unstoppable flow of love toward all others.

Unless we too are affected by the affection of Jesus to this same high degree where moment by moment, every moment of our existence is so full of the peace and tranquility of the Spirit of God and a unity with Him at that level, that ecstasies are no longer needed as a means of escape from our anguish of soul, but will continue to be experienced with great delight, we will continue to live on a perpetual emotional roller-coaster, carrying our frustration and anxiety rather than the peace of God to those around us.

It is highly likely that ecstasies are perceived by many as getting closer to God than living in intimacy. And to some degree this may be true. Intimacy tends to be expressed in more of a bedroom experience with God in the state of aftermath of the ecstasy of that place. Intimacy looks very tranquil almost to the point of inactivity. But the peace of the soul is greatest in every human soul immediately following the moment of ecstasy (the point of ejaculation or orgasm). The moment of ecstasy can not be sustained indefinitely as it would lead to exhaustion and death. But the moment of release can be sustained forever.

Once intimacy is achieved, the need for ecstasies is gone. However, when ecstasies are experienced from a base line of intimacy, they are far greater in intensity and duration. They become moments of extreme connectedness to God's love, but abate only to the level of constant awareness and experience of the presence of God wherein reside the permanent emotions of love, joy, and peace of God.

If you want the constancy of the peace and presence of God, you cannot be seeking for ecstasies. Ecstasies are intended to be spontaneous gifts from God and NOT deliveries to pitiful beggars who are seeking their own pleasure rather than to bring pleasure to God. This might be better said "to BE the pleasure of God." We become the pleasure of God by surrendering every faculty and capacity of one's self to God for God's sole use and pleasure wherein I experience His pleasure by His use of my being which was created for that very purpose. Php 2:13 " For it is God who works in you both to will and to do of his good pleasure."

The place of intimacy, since it is sustainable constantly, puts me in a "state-of-mind of Christ." This is when I am completely available to God waiting for His direction and command, instantly moving to do His bidding when I see or hear His directives. When I am in the state of ecstasy, I am being energized by the titillation of God, but am in that moment unavailable for His dispatch. If I remain in intimacy, He, God, determines the times of ecstasy that won't interfere with His desire to dispatch me to do His will with and for others. As with human ecstasy, it is spontaneously moving in the moment to achieve and enjoy the ascent to the pinnacle of orgasm and then relaxing in the tranquility that only exists in orgasm's wake. It is only at this point and in this state that the constant outflow of affection through me refreshes the thirsty with God's water of life, His love.

My prayer for everyone is now that each will find intimacy with God (and thereby with others) as it takes the ecstasies and binds them together into a cohesive network of spiritual connections within the soul which become the fabric of the life of Jesus. In this state there is a constant peace and complete contentment in Jesus which eliminate the need and even the desire to connect with others in sordid relationships which are unhealthy, unwholesome, and displeasing to God.

Yes! We are always forgiven! And Yes! We are never forsaken! But that does not mean that He is not, at times, displeased with either our approach to Him or our approach to others. Selflessness can only be achieved when we become intimate with God as the other expressions toward Him, intensity and ecstasy are seeking God's pouring on us, rather than being poured out for others, emptied as it were, for His pleasure.

Solomon sought wisdom and knowledge and was also granted riches, wealth, honor, and peace with other nations. Similarly when we pursue only intimacy with God, the intimacy will produce

as by-products both ecstasies and intensities. The difference in this order is that God receives the greatest glory and we the greatest pleasure. "Ye ask and receive not, because you ask amiss that you may consume it upon your lust (desire for self gratification, self promotion, or self service).

Pursuing God, while leading with intensity, I may fall prey to self-promotion or self-sovereignty. "SEE ME!" or "SERVE ME!"

Pursuing God, while leading with ecstasy, I may fall prey to self-gratification. "GIVE ME!"
